

MR. J. WRIGHT NEIL

Last May Mr. J. Wright Neil, who was Principal of Lisgar Collegiate.from 1%0 to 1972, died in hospital. In his thirty-three years at the school he made a great contribution to the quality of education at Lisgar. During this period he served as an English teacher, guidance counsellor, vice-principal and principal.

Mr. Neil, as principal, provided excellent leadership for the school. Under his direction great emphasis was placed on promoting good discipline, sound scholar—ship and concern for the individual student. Mr. Neil was an alert warm and underatanding person who took great interest in his students and their activities. He had an extremely retentive memory and could recall names of former students with little difficulty.

Mr. Neil was an exceptional principal who was very highly regarded by both staff members and Lisgar students. We were so pleased that in 198+ he was able to join us and participate in our 14-Oth Anniversary celebrations.

SCHOLARSHIPS AND AWARDS

Lisgar graduates are maintaining the excellent academic performance of their predecessors. A number of graduates received awards and scholarships from various universities and institutions throughout the country and U.S.A.

One young lady was accepted at the prestigious General Motors Institute at Flint, Michigan, in Industrial Engineering. "ALL" costs of her education for four years are underwritten by a corporate sponsor. This same sponsor guarantees employment as a manager trainee during holiday periods at a handsome wage rate.

Another student was offered and accepted the prestigious Tricolour Scholarship at Queen's University (maximum value 4,170). This same student was offered a combination of scholarships by the University of Toronto, including one with a strong Lisgar connection. The Hardie Award for Classics is a scholarship which was established in the name of W.H. Hardie, a graduate of University of Toronto and a teacher of Classics at Lisgar, 1905 - 1920.

We are very proud of our senior students who won Lisgar and Ottawa Board of Education awards for graduating students. Ten graduates received O.B.E. Bronze medals for obtaining 90% or over in their year's work. 77 graduates achieved the Ontario Scholar Award for obtaining 80% or over on their year's work.

were all awarded to students who are most worthy scholars.

Approximately 230 students graduated from Grade XIII in 1985. About 85% of Lisgar graduates proceed to University studies. This year was no exception and the choices of institutions included Dalhousie, Mount Allison, St. Mary's, St. Francis Xavier, McGill, Concordia, Ryerson, and some western universities, as well as a number of American Universities. We are confident that these most recent grads are well prepared to meet the challenge and we wish them every success.

CLASSICS ARE ALIVE AND WELL AT LISGAR

Latin is still being offered from Grades 9 to 13. There are 265 students taking it this year - four grade 9 classes, 3 grade 10, two grade 11, two grade 12 and one grade 13.

Also the class in Greek continues quite well and meets either before school or at lunchtime.

The non-language Classical Civilization class also forms an interesting part of the department.

Lisgar has the largest enrollment of students registered in Latin and Greek courses of any school in the province.
