



MEMORIAL PRESENTATION in honour of SERGEANT EDWARD J.G. HOLLAND, V.C. ROYAL CANADIAN DRAGOONS

On Friday, November 7th, a special assembly was held at Lisgar Collegiate to present a plaque in memory of a former graduate, Sergeant Edward Holland, V.C., of the Royal Canadian Dragoons. Sergeant Holland was awarded the Victoria Cross for conspicuous bravery in action during the Boer War, at Leliefontein, Komati River, South Africa, on November 7th, 1900.

In order that this assembly might be more meaningful for the students, we arranged to have a person on stage dressed in a military uniform similar to that worn by Sergeant Holland. We wish to thank Mr. Robert Anglin, a member of the Museum of Applied Military History, for his assistance in this matter.

Mr. Glavin, Principal of Lisgar Collegiate, extended a warm welcome to all our guests. Among those seated on the stage were: Brigadier-General G.G. Bell, Colonel of the Royal Canadian Dragoons, Lt. Colonel D.A. Henderson, Mr. Edward Holland and Mrs. Judy Kahn, the grandson and grand-daughter of Major Holland. Other special guests in the audience included several retired Lisgar teachers.

As November 7th, or Leliefontein Day is a special day for all Dragoons throughout the world, we were delighted to have in attendance several officers, of whom two were former Lisgar students - Ted Day and Jim Soame.

The two co-presidents of Lisgar Collegiate read a biography of Major Edward Holland which was prepared by Mr. Sydney Bateman, a former Lisgar head-boy (1944). It was his researches and initiative that persuaded the Alumni Association to proceed with this memorial tribute.

We were most fortunate to have Brigadier-General Bell, M.B.E., C.D., Colonel of the Royal Canadian Dragoons, present to address us on this important occasion. Dr. Bell complimented the Alumni Association for undertaking this memorial presentation in honour of Sergeant Holland. He pointed out to the students the importance of remembering with pride the achievements of the past. However, as he said, it is not enough only to remember, we have also to use our initiative and efforts to secure peace in the present and for the future. Dr. Bell reminded the students of the great number of young Canadians serving in Canada's Armed Forces in different parts of the world, and of the importance of their contribution in the maintenance of peace. "The Price of freedom is eternal vigilance".

Mrs. Kathy Ullrich, a member of the executive of the Alumni Association presented the memorial plaque to Mr. Glavin to accept on behalf of the school. It will be placed in the Memorial Hall of Lisgar Collegiate.

Mr. Edward Holland, on behalf of his sister and himself expressed their deep appreciation for this tribute to their grandfather.

At the conclusion of the assembly, the guests were invited to join the Alumni Association for a light luncheon at the H.M.C.S. Bytown Naval Officers' Mess.

J. WRIGHT NEIL SCHOLARSHIP

Last June, Mrs. Etta Neil arranged to have a scholarship established at Lisgar Collegiate Institute in memory of her late husband, J. Wright Neil, who was a staff member of Lisgar Collegiate from 1939-72. During this time, he served as a teacher from 1939-51, as Vice-Principal from 1951-60, and Principal from 1960-72.

This Scholarship, which has value of approximately five hundred dollars, is to be awarded annually, and will be self-perpetuating.

It is to be awarded to the Lisgar Collegiate student who in his/her final year fulfills most suitably the following conditions:

- 1) the student must have shown leadership qualities in extra-curricular activities and made an outstanding contribution to the life of the school.
- 2) the student must have maintained high scholastic standing in his/her final year.
- 3) students who are recipients of major university scholarships will not be considered eligible for this award.

We were pleased that Mrs. Neil was able to be present at Lisgar Collegiate Commencement Exercises on November 1st to make the presentation to the first recipient of the J. Wright Neil Scholarship, Colin Gray. Colin was also selected to be the valedictorian for the Commencement.

ITEMS OF INTEREST RE FORMER STUDENTS

Dr. M. Carman Pettapiece (Lisgar 1923-26) has been the Medical Officer for the Maine Wing USAF - Civil Air Patrol (rank Lt. Col.) for 45 years. In 1958, Dr. Pettapiece was physician to 25 Maine Citizens travelling to Alaska to welcome it into the union. A subsequent excursion took place in 1984 when Dr. Pettapiece and six of the original 25 Maine citizens returned to celebrate Alaska's 25th Anniversary of Statehood.

Dr. Pettapiece was recently presented the Frederick G. Payne Memorial Award, the highest honor bestowed on a state volunteer. Carmen was honored for his work with the American Cancer Society in the Maine Division.

Anne (Heggtveit) Hamilton, (Lisgar 1952-57) writes from Grand Isle, Vermont, regarding her recent return to University as a part-time student: "What really spurred me on was the last Lisgar Reunion. It was the cohesive ingredient needed to cement my plans. The old friends and colleagues were an inspiration for me.
