# 204 Graduate in June Ceremony

Lisgar held its 1989 Graduation at 3:00 p.m. on June 29th. It was a beautiful day, sunny but not too hot. The commencement ceremony was held outside on the Mall between the North and South buildings. The stage was set up in front of the "boys" entrance so the audience could admire not only our graduates but also the historic architectural backdrop of the old school with the motto *Alere Flammam* in bas-relief on the wall directly above the stage.

The Lisgar graduates (95% of the 204 graduates were in attendance) and the staff marshalled in the gymnasium. The Lisgar Concert Band played the

Processional March at the appointed hour and the audience stood as the staff and gowned graduates marched to their reserved seats. Special guests including Walter Mann, former head of the English Department, added a unique historic touch to the occasion.

The 1989 graduating class brought tremendous distinction to Lisgar's already well established tradition of academic excellence. There were 109 Ontario Scholars achieving an average of over 80% in their grade thirteen/OAC studies. Our graduates earned entrance to Cambridge University, Harvard, Princeton, William & Mary and Cornell in addition to all major Canadian universities.

In total dollars, the 1989 graduating class won more ma-jor scholarships than any previous class. Whether it was the new \$8,000 Canada Scholarships or major scholarships in the \$12,000 to \$14,000 range, Lisgar was well represented. Entrance scholarships numbered in the dozens and of course one cannot forget Robin Spence's success in winning the prestigious Morehead, whose value is in the \$50,000 range over four years. Lisgarites of all ages can be justifiably proud of the 1989 Lisgar Grads.



The Memorial Hall on Lisgar's first floor main entrance contains two large engraved plaques commemorating those graduates who sacrificed their lives during World War I and II and two walls of engraved brass tablets commemorating those Lisgarites who fought in the defence of Canada.

Last year, a committee of Lisgar Veterans chaired by John Dunfield worked very hard to make sure that the names of all Lisgarites who served are mounted in the Hall. In addition they attempted to get the names of former students who served in the Korean Conflict in order that we could complete the Memorial recognition of all veterans who served in Canada's 3 official wars.

The committee is certain that they haven't identified every Lisgar veteran but they have added several names to the list. Out of the research and related archival documents came the following Lisgar student whose name had not yet appeared— Pilot Officer Hugh Norman McLeod.

Sgt. Air Bomber Hugh Norman McLeod was flying in an RCAF Halifax bomber over Europe on the night of September 15th on a bombing missions to Kiel. Captured German documents referred to in the archival material indicate that two Halifax bombers were shot down on the 16th September, 1944 at 0105 hours near Oste-



rholm, Denmark. Apparently the two bombers collided in mid-air and their wreckage was strewn over a large area, making identification difficult. The deceased were buried in a communal grave in Aabenraa Cemetery, Denmark.

The archival documents show that McLeod was commissioned with the rank of Pilot Officer with effect from September 14th, 1944 and that a certification of presumption of death was issued on August 13th, 1945. Identification was made by way of a Canadian Air Bomber's Brevet, the initials McL in red cotton on the back of the shirt, as well as initials S McL and ML on the back of the shirt and on the handkerchief the initials S McL. McLeod is buried in the Allied Military Plot Aabenraa Cemetery, Denmark, in row 5, grave 12. May he rest in peace.

Éven from the dry, unemotional reports from the RCAF casualty section, it is not hard to imagine the grief felt by his family, especially as his loss was difficult to confirm. Such was the sacrifice made countless times through the wars by young Canadians. It is the least we can do to always remember their sacrifices and to celebrate our peace.

The Alumni Association will continue the work of updating the Memorial List to ensure all our graduates who gave so freely are recognized in our own small way in the school's Memorial Hall. We encourage all Lisgar War veterans to complete the veterans form on the back of the membership invoice/renewal page if you have not already done so previously.

# Lisgar Alumnus Wins GMI Travel Award

Jane E. Boon, a management systems student at GMI Engineering & Management Institute, Flint, MI, has been named recipient of a 1989 alumni Association Travelship award for a sixweek working visit to West Germany.

Jane, daughter of Dave and Frances Boon of Ottawa, was one of ten GMI students selected on the basis of scholastic achievement, leadership qualities, and community involvement.

Outstanding students are awarded travel expenses and the opportunity, in cooperation with their sponsoring companies, to travel to other parts of North America or abroad for a six week learning and work experience. They also visit other places of cultural, political and economic significance.

Jane's travelship work experience will be with Magna International, Wolfsburg, West Germany. She is sponsored by Magna International, Markham, Ontario.

GMI Engineering, & Management Institute, with a student enrollment of nearly 3,000, is the United States' only accredited college of engineering and management operating on a fiveyear cooperative plan of education.

year cooperative plan of education. Founded in 1919, GMI was part of General Motors Corporation until 1982, when it became an independent institution and ceased to be known as General Motors Institute.

The college offers bachelor of science degrees in mechanical, industrial, electrical, and manufacturing systems engineering, and management systems. A masters degree is offered in manufacturing management. Students alternate 12-week periods of classroom and laboratory academic studies with work experience at about 300 sponsoring businesses and organizations in the United States and Canada.

## New Prize Given at Commencement Honours Former English Head

Lisgar's newest academic award, The Walter B. Mann-Prize, was presented to David Moon at the June Commencement exercises. This prize, established by the English Department to recognize excellence in writing, is named for the man who served as Head of the department from 1938 to 1968.

The winner is selected by the members of the English Department who base their judgement on the written work of the senior years. Each has his/her name inscribed on a plaque which will be kept in the Trophy Case at Lisgar.

The first presentation was made memorable by the presence of Mr. Mann who expressed his pleasure and pride in having an award named in his honour. Former students will appreciate naming this award after Mr. Mann since one of his goals as a teacher was to help his students achieve clarity and elegance in their written work.

The following are excerpts from the 1939-40 Vox Lycei.

"The successful conduct of the war is of course the chief concern of Canadians at this time. This is none the less true of us Canadian High School students. Although we cannot yet be of great service to the Empire in its war effort we can at least carry on by diligently acquiring that education which will be so useful and so necessary when the "star of peace returns".

"In the educational, as well as on the battle field there has been marked local activity. Among the number of our recent acquisitions we count a new principal, seven new teachers, and two new departments (Domestic Science and Manual Training)."

"Hence, we of the fifth form leave Lisgar with the sincere conviction that the O.C.I. (Lisgar) will continue to lead in Secondary Schooling in Ottawa as it has done for the past 97 years. If our confidence is justified, Lisgar will celebrate a proud centennial in 1943. To commemorate this great event the student council plans a Centennial Issue of the Vox Lycei in that year."

"Lisgarites of past and present are therefore invited to contribute to this record that Lisgar's first century may be fittingly celebrated. The season is now open."

"After 14 years of undisputed possession of the Senior Interscholastic City championship, R.D. Campbell's Glebe seniors fell before a fighting Blue and Grey Squad. Never before has Lisgar produced such a high-scoring team, averaging 49.5 points a game." Team members included J. Seed (Mgr.), G. Mackey, D. McLean, A. Mackey, K. Checkland, Mr. Rothwell (Coach), D. Merkley, K.Fee, B. Avery, J. Leggett, R. Canning.

"It was snowing and raining for this year's meet in Cornwall, but a team of nine Lisgar girls captured the E.O.S.S.A. cup. They finished with a score of 30 points, while Smith's Falls in second placed gained only 16." Team members included V. Brampton, B. Carey, I. Duguid, M. Shea, E. Holmes, B. Fenton, G. Ketchum.

## Lisgar Space Mission Blasts Off Once Again

Plans are underway for an even more ambitious International Student Space Simulation this year. Building on last year's extremely successful mission, simultaneous simulated missions will take place around the world on January 29, 1990. As a charter member of the project, Lisgar will again contribute to the Houston mission in many subject areas. Students are planning science experiments, techological components, art work, computer projects, music videos and a variety of other endeavours related to space or as contributions to an international exhange.

We will be hosting a group of Texas students at the end of October and again hope to send a small group to be part of the mission team in Houston. For many students, space is a highly motivating topic and the quality of the students' efforts has been outstanding. There is almost no subject area that cannot be related to this simulation/exchange.

We again hope to obtain sponsorship to defray transportation costs, so that finances will not be a factor if a student wishes to participate, and to provide a fund that can be used to provide materials for student projects. (Last year, an excellent space suit was produced and used on the mission, but it cost about \$300.). Our first sponsor, Computer Business Centre Inc., has al-

ready joined us by lending the school a high-powered computer system that can serve as a dedicated communications link to other schools. Any suggestions from alumni of potential sponsors will be gratefully received. We are looking for finances, materials and services. Last year's sponsors seemed to feel that
