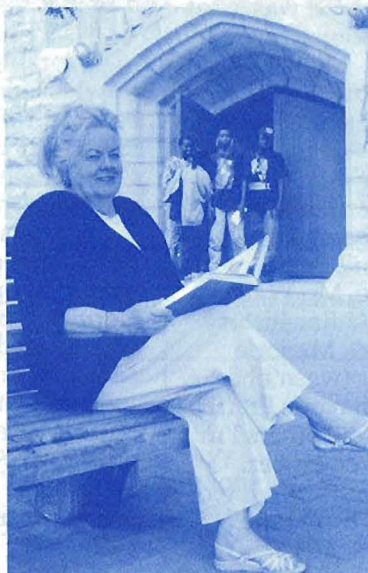
# Alere Flammam

## Lisgar receives Coat of Arms

Lisgar Collegiate, as part of next year's Sesquicentennial celebrations, will be only the second high school in Canada to receive an officially sanctioned coat of arms. The Letters Patent have been accepted and the basic design recently agreed upon.

The design will include "elements" from the coats of arms of both Baron Lisgar, after whom Lisgar Street and Collegiate were named, and the Earl of Dufferin who laid the cornerstone of the original building. Occupying the "Fess" (central band) of the "escutcheon" (shield) will be our traditional logo, the lamp of knowledge, and of course the motto will be *alere flammam*.

January 1990 marked the genesis of the idea for Lisgar's coat of arms as part of our 150th Anniversary celebrations. George Toller (Head Boy 1945) informed Doug Arrand, Chairman of the Lisgar 150th Committee, that Kingston Collegiate and Vocational Institute was the first high school in Canada to be granted a coat of arms, for

their sesquicentennial celebration. George Toller saw no reason why Lisgar couldn't be the second!

Doug Arrand approached colleague John Boehmer ('64) to head up the project. John, together with Michael Measures ('47), initiated the process of obtaining Lisgar's Coat of Arms.

Michael Measures' repu-

tation precedes him. His keen interest in heraldry naturally led him into becoming the founding president of the Heraldry Society of Canada's Ottawa Valley Branch. In the course of developing the Branch from scratch, Michael's leadership helped to produce events which exemplified cultural, genealogical, historical, and social aspects of heraldry, including Canada's cultural mosaic with influences originating abroad and with our aboriginal peoples. Michael's assistance in helping all of us to understand the intricacies of heraldry, and how to go about dealing with the Chief Herald, Robert Watt, had been invaluable.

In June 1988, when heraldry was patriated to Canada the Governor General, the Right Honourable Ramon John Hnatyshun, became head of the Canadian Heraldic Authority. His principle advisor is Robert D. Watt, who occupies the office of Chief Herald of Canada.

## Thank you, Marie Hutt

In June 1992, the Lisgar Alumni Association said fond farewell to Marie (Callaghan) Hutt. During the past seven years, Marie has donated two half-days per week as our Association's first secretary. In that capacity, Marie set up our Alumni office and established the record keeping systems. She recorded all new members, issued annual membership cards and prepared all tax receipts for donations received by the Lisgar Fund. She dealt with all correspondence efficiently, typed and distributed minutes of the executive meetings and, in general, ran the day-to-day administration of the Association.

Working at first out of a windowless, cramped office in the basement of Lisgar, Marie maintained her good humour. If there was something to be done, Marie would be there!

Marie's loyalty and tremendous service to Lisgar go back many years. She grew up on Cooper Street where her home was located just behind the present Lisgar Gymnasium (today the site of the Park Lane Hotel). She attended Lisgar in the 1930s and years later came back to serve as Lisgar's Guidance Secretary until her retirement in 1985.

At that time, our Alumni Association was very much in



need of secretarial assistance. We approached Marie with our request for assistance and were delighted with her positive response.

In the spring of 1992, Marie informed us she would be leaving in June to live near her two daughters and their families in southern Ontario. She wanted to spend more time with her grandchildren.

Reluctantly we accepted Marie's resignation. The Executive honoured Marie at a reception hosted by Vice-President David Whitfield at the Laurentian Club one evening in May before she left Ottawa. Marie was presented with a framed print of Lisgar along with our very best wishes for continued good health and happiness. Thank you, Marie.

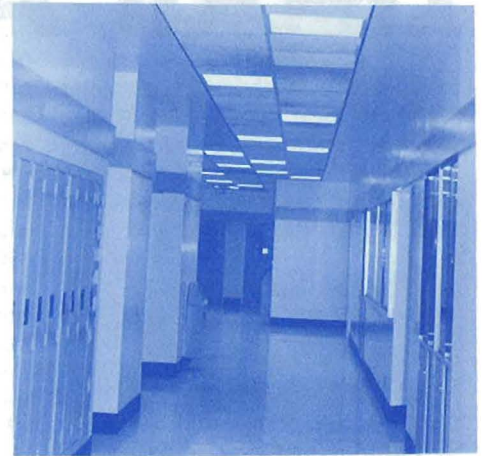
*Doc MacArthur & His Blue Notes*

## Lisgar becomes energy efficient

Most of our alumni will be aware that Lisgar received some badly needed renovations in 1976-77. The refurbished building sported a fresh new look with hallways that featured carpeted floors and indirect valance lighting. While these innovations gained instant popularity with the student body for the relaxed, informal atmosphere that was created, time has shown they were not very practical.

The carpeting proved to be extremely difficult to clean and maintain. The wear and tear that resulted from the heavy traffic made it necessary to replace the carpeting every few years. The indirect lighting also had its problems. It was very inefficient and Lisgar's energy consumption was much higher than other schools of a comparable size. To lower the maintenance and operating costs in this period of fiscal restraint, changes had to be made.

Last year a number of alterations were completed in the school. The carpeting was removed and replaced with an easy-to-maintain tile floor. A more energy efficient overhead lighting system has replaced the valance

lighting, both in Lisgar's halls and in the cafeteria. A fresh coat of paint in the hallways completed the job.

As a result, Lisgar's corridors are noticeably cleaner and certainly a lot brighter. In some areas of the building, the ambient light level has quadrupled, while at the same time, our energy consumption had decreased significantly, making for a much more efficient Lisgar Collegiate.

The functions of Chief Herald as they relate to Lisgar's application for a Coat of Arms, in recognition of next year's sesquicentennial, are as follows: to receive our "petition" for Arms; to signal acceptance of our petition by the issuing of a "Warrant"; and to refine

the "Letters Patent" which describe the Crown's action in favour of our educational "corporation." The last function of the Chief Herald pertains to the negotiation of the concept and the actual design of the Arms. Here, he must ensure that aesthetic, technical and historical standards apply and that the recipient is content with the proposal.



# 150th Anniversary Weekend

The Steering Committee for the Sesquicentennial (150th) Weekend (Thanksgiving weekend, October 1993) has been formed and the plans for the 150th anniversary are beginning to take shape.

For those Alumni who will be coming from out of town, blocks of rooms at special group rates have been booked at the following hotels: the Park Lane; the Lord Elgin; Howard Johnson's; the Radisson and the Beacon Arms.

Arrangements have also been made for use of the various facilities at the Region Municipality of Ottawa-Carleton Headquarters located immediately adjacent to Lisgar (where the DND temporary buildings stood for many years). These facilities include underground parking for about 800 cars and various sized rooms which could be used for meetings, class reunions, displays, etc.

## Thursday, Oct. 7th

The weekend's activities will kick off with Blue-Gray Spirit Night. This event will be held in the gym and will feature displays, slide shows, music and refreshments. It will be an opportunity for all former Lisgarites of both sexes to meet, renew old friendships and re-ignite the old Lisgar spirit.

## Friday, Oct. 8th

The day's activities will begin with an assembly for current students in the morning. Following that, school will be dismissed, and decade rooms, displays and booths will be set up in preparation for the open house. Registration will begin at 12 noon, and at that time, the school will be open to the general public for visitation. One highlight of the festivities will be the arrival of the Lisgar students' canoe expedition from Kingston bringing greetings from Kingston Collegiate and Vocational Institute, which recently celebrated its two hundredth anniversary.



During the open house, a lounge will be set aside for present and former teachers to meet former students.

An evening assembly program is planned at 7 pm for alumni, featuring the official opening ceremonies, the presentation of the school's coat of arms, and entertainment by current and former Lisgarites.

Following the assembly, alumni will move to the Regional Headquarters building next door for the Principal's Reception. This will provide an opportunity for alumni to meet with old friends and former teachers. Music will be provided by present Lisgar students, and refreshments will be available.

## Saturday, Oct. 9th

Saturday morning will be designated as "Activity Morning." Alumni are encouraged to get involved in old boy/girl games, walks or runs by the canal to enjoy the fall colours, touch football games on the field and other physical activities. In addition, the open house activities will continue, including the art show and musical presentations by current and former Lisgar musicians. A student-run hot-dog and hamburger barbecue will take care of lunch and a fashion show featuring the work of some of Lisgar's former students will be the highlight of the afternoon's activities.

On Saturday evening, a dinner/dance will be held in the Congress Centre, sponsored by the Alumni Association. This will be a semi-formal affair, with the 10-piece Stevens & Kennedy Band playing from 9 pm - 1 am. Other entertainment will be provided by some of Lisgar's well-known alumni.

Festivities will conclude on Sunday morning with informal class reunions, a catered brunch to be held at the school and the official closing ceremonies.

# Remembrance Day

The march of Lisgar students to the Cenotaph in Ottawa on Remembrance Day marked a rebirth of Lisgar's historic association with freedom and defence of country which began over 140 years ago.

From the first cadet corps formed in 1866, through the Boer War, two World Wars and Korea, Lisgar students have responded in defence of their country. Today the tradition continues as Canada participates in United Nations peace-keeping activities. The act of remembrance performed by today's students ensures that dedication to peace and freedom will continue to be part of our heritage.

The tradition of cadets at Lisgar began with the Victoria Cadet Corp Drill Association in 1866. At the time, Canada expected to be invaded by the Fenians, and Lisgar was still the Ottawa Grammar School. These cadets also formed the honour guard for Governor General Viscount Monck at the opening of the first Canadian Parliament in 1867.

In the Memorial Hall at Lisgar, a plaque commemorates Edward Holland, awarded a Victoria Cross in 1899. Probably inspired by his heroism, the 94th Cadet Corps was established in 1903. During the First World

War, another former Lisgar student, Alexis Helmer, became a footnote in history when his death inspired a friend, John McCrae, to write *In Flanders Fields* in a dugout in Belgium in 1915.

During the 1920s, the tradition continued, although the cadet corps became affiliated with militia units instead of schools. With war clouds looming once again in 1939, Lisgar helped reactivate the units. During the Royal Visit in 1939, cadets with issued military uniforms lined the parade route. Very active during World War II, cadets added weapons courses, map reading and aircraft recognition to the musketry, signalling and first aid already taught. The *Vox Lycei* yearbook for 1946-47 reports the largest enrolment of cadets in corps history, but suddenly all mention of cadets disappeared from the school. What had been a proud tradition had unaccountably disappeared.

The decision to attend the national ceremony in 1991 resulted in a thousand Lisgar students walking the half-mile to the War Memorial. Again this year Lisgarites renewed their commitment to freedom by remembering the dedication and sacrifice of many former students.

Standing alone in the Memorial Hall of Lisgar on November 11, 1992, was a very dejected man. Mr. Doug Arrand offered help, but the man had come to see the principal, Mr. D.I. Macdonald, and tell him his story. But, Mr. Macdonald, the staff and students had already left for the pilgrimage to the Cenotaph and the national Remembrance Day ceremonies there.

This is the story. Fifty years ago to the day and almost to the hour, the man, Mr. W.F. Sloan, was on his way from Sandy Hill to Lisgar. Crossing Laurier Street Bridge (late for school), he saw the soldiers parading from the Drill Hall toward the Cenotaph for the 1942 Remembrance Day

ceremonies. Instantly, he decided to continue down Laurier Street, up to Queen, and straight to the recruiting centre, where he enlisted in the R.C.A.F. Then he marched right back to Lisgar, to Mr. J. Dunlop's office, and announced that he was quitting school.

He had, indeed, never returned again until, accompanied by his daughter, he had travelled from Beaverton, Ontario, this November 11th. His disappointment that he could not tell his story to the current principle was alleviated somewhat when, after a conducted tour of the school, he found his name on the W.W. II Memorial Tablets in our Memorial Hall.
