Spring Concert Celebrates Alumni Donors

ou could not have asked for a more perfect spring afternoon for the Lisgar Alumni Auditorium Donor Appreciation Event, held on Sunday April 30, 2006. The event was to thank the generous donors-Benefactors, Patrons, and Sponsors-who altogether contributed \$47,685.68 for the refurbishment of the Alumni auditorium. During Lisgar's 160th anniversary, which took place in 2004, the Friends of Lisgar Campaign chose to donate funds raised to the Auditorium because it had not been significantly restored for over 20 years.

The results are a must-see: an enlarged stage that can now hold the very impressive full Lisgar orchestra, newly painted walls in a soft grey with blue accents, framed historical photographs of the school, upgraded brass light fixtures, and refurbished theatrelike upholstered blue seating. As an acknowledgement of donor contributions, each donor's name has been engraved on a brass plaque and placed on a chair. Donors were able to locate their plaque by the listings set out in the program. One alumni noted that his plaque was affixed to the same front row seat that he had often been assigned as a student so that his teach-

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ers could keep an eye on him!

The approximately 275 attendees at the event also included School Trustees and the families of Lisgar students. Guests were treated to an afternoon music concert provided by current students in the school's wellrespected and much-touted music program, for which there is often a waiting list for enrolment. One enthusiastic attendee was Mr. John Roebuck, a Lisgar Music teacher during the 1970s. A fellow alumnus, Mr. Savvas Lithopolous (1975) was able to track him down and escort Mr. Roebuck to the event. Mrs. Trudy Bradley, retiring Music Director, conducted both the string ensemble and senior orchestra in the performance of several classical pieces. Both Mr. Roebuck and Mrs. Bradley have left a deep musical impression on their students. Several alumni noted that Mrs. Bradley remembers every one of her students—by the instrument that they played. A more recent addition to the Lisgar music program is Music Director Mr. Richard Arrigo, who conducted the senior jazz and wind ensembles, and in the true spirit of the "show must go on" stepped in at the last minute to play the trumpet.

A reception followed the music concert. Students and attendees enjoyed refreshments and a wide selection of sweet treats. There was much good cheer, conversation, and reminiscences as people roamed around the Library and the main floor, sampling the treats and looking at the many displays set up for this event. All in all, it was a very successful and pleasant way to spend an afternoon at Lisgar.

The Alumni Association would especially like to thank the school staff, including: Principal Karen Gledhill, Office Administrator Neil Petrie, Cheryl and Kristiana Dudley (auditorium restoration), and the Alumni volunteers led by Rod Hagglund, whose recent bout of laryngitis was kept at bay while he was Master of Ceremonies.



A Tribute to Dr. Janet Morchain Head of Social Sciences 1973-1995

anet died of heart failure on Monday, December 12, 2005 in the company of her husband, Michael Wall. She had suffered from Parkinson's Disease and spinal damage for some years.

Having attended high school at Havergal College in Toronto, Janet received her post secondary education at Trinity College at the University of Toronto, and the University of Rochester. Declining offers to teach at the university level, Janet chose instead to dedicate her career to teaching high school first in Oakville, Ontario, and then in Ottawa. In Ottawa, she taught at Sir Wilfrid Laurier and Champlain High Schools before joining the staff at Lisgar Collegiate in 1973, as head of Social Sciences. She remained at Lisgar until her retirement in 1995.

Janet was known for her scholarship and it is said she was a fascinating classroom teacher. One parent credits her with having inspired his son to pursue studies in History. Janet had many other interests as well. She was a member of the Conservative party, having served as president of the provincial and federal riding associations, and subsequently as a member of the board of the Ottawa West-Nepean Conservatives until her death. Janet also wrote two books: Sharing the Continent, which is about Canadian-U.S. relations, and Search for a *Nation*, which is about English-French relations in Canada since 1759. At the time of her death, she had just completed a third edition of Search for a

Nation, which is to be published by Fitzhenry and Whiteside. Her husband, Michael, affectionately related the fact that she had never adapted to the technology of the computer and had typed her manuscripts on her faithful old Remington.

Janet had a great fondness for Lisgar and served as a member of the Alumni Association executive for many years. She was always an enthusiastic early-bird to sign up for homecomings, such as the recent 160th celebration. Many of her female students from the 1970s gathered around her at this reunion to thank her for being a role model by encouraging them to pursue a university education and post-graduate studies.

Among Janet's several qualities spoken of at her funeral were her commitment and loyalty. Lisgar has benefited greatly from these attributes.

Notes from Down Below

Since the last newsletter, the Memorial Hall has been updated with the addition of five names that had been missing from the World War II plaque: Roy Abrahamson, Lois Bayley, Myer (Merv) Ginsberg, Gordon Johnston, and Graham Stremes. In addition, the plate for Harry Dover, mistakenly identified as Henry Dover on the First World War plaque, has finally been corrected. Another name of interest is that of Wendel Clark, a paratrooper killed in Normandy in 1944. Wendel, who attended Lisgar in the years 1928-1930, was a member of the First Canadian Parachute Batallion and is the subject of a book entitled Paratrooper. Wendel's nephew discovered that his uncle was not listed among the war dead on the plaque in Lisgar's Memorial Hall and brought it to our attention. An effort will be made to remedy this error; however, the fact that this plaque has the names permanently inscribed in bas relief presents more of a challenge.

There continues to be an interest in Vox, both in terms of donations and those expressing an interest with the intention to purchase. Gary Neal Hanson was delighted to be able to purchase copies of the 1984-88 Vox that his wife, Dawna Duff, had lost while attending McGill University. This surprise was all the more special in that the books arrived on their sixthmonth anniversary. They reside in the United States. Another request from the United States came from Alexander Grushin who attended Lisgar in grade nine. He has fond memories of the school and wished to purchase the copies for what would have been his final two years at Lisgar, had he remained (he had the two intervening years' books). To those who continue to donate, your gracious gesture is much appreciated. Thanks to your generosity, we have received eight of the copies we requested as of our last newsletter. Still wanted are: 1911, 1914 (spring), 1914 (fall), 1922, 1924, 1955, 1959, and 1960.

In recent months the alumni showcase has featured three exhibits displaying archival materials. The first, mounted to coincide Remembrance Day, contained many pictures and other pertinent items having to do with World War II (the previous year's display highlighted World War I). The 2006 Winter Olympics provided an opportune time to show off the ski poles of Olympic champion and Canadian Athlete of the Year (1960), Anne Heggtveit. The display included related pictures and newspaper articles, as well as some highlighting the career of Donald Jackson, former Olympic Figure Skating champion. The antique skates of Nigel Stephens, Canadian Figure Skating champion and member of the figure skating Hall of Fame, completed the exhibit. Finally, the current exhibit mounted for the Alumni reception, recognizing those who had contributed to the auditorium refurbishment contains medals, crests, and pins created by and for Lisgarites over the decades—form pins, Students' Council pins, award medallions. A Grand Reopening for the Alumni Auditorium

On December 1, 2005, a ceremony was held to mark the official reopening of Lisgar's venerable auditorium following the renovations made possible by your donations to the Friends of Lisgar campaign. The occasion was the opening night of the (1950) Broadway musical *Guys and Dolls*, performed by an enthusiastic and able group of Lisgar students under the leadership of Mrs. Trudy Bradley and Mr. Richard Arrigo.

Before the performance, Principal Karen Gledhill invited seven members of your Alumni Executive on stage for a ribbon-cutting ceremony. The ceremony marked not only the completion of this part of the renovations, but also the renaming of the auditorium as the Alumni Auditorium, in honour of the Friends of Lisgar donors and all the generations of Lisgarites who have gathered in this facility for assemblies, plays, and concerts over its long history. The name is permanently inscribed on the archway over the main entrance.

The renovation and painting have restored the old hall to the elegance that it had once known before age, use, and the funding cutbacks of recent years caused its beauty to fade. The colour scheme, which respects the Blue and Grey traditions of the school, was designed by Lisgar student Kristiana Dudley and her mother, Cheryl Dudley. The Alumni executive was consulted on the plans before the

major work commenced in the late summer. Photographs of the school from earlier years (in frames made from rescued squares of the old tin ceilings!), and posters from past Lisgar plays and musicals adorn the walls.

The true dedication, of course, took place a few moments after the ceremony, as the curtain rose on an energetic and hilarious rendition of Guys and Dolls, and as the music, laughter, and applause of students, parents, teachers, friends, and alumni filled the auditorium to join with the echoes of days gone by. Luck was cer-

tainly a Lady for everyone who took the chance to come to this performance!

Much more work is still required to bring the Alumni Auditorium up to full standards, particularly in the areas of sound, lighting, and other behind-the-scenes needs. The nearly \$50,000 raised thus far has been a great start, but that much again is still needed. Every bit helps and we appreciate the donations that continue to arrive. The plaques on the auditorium seats honouring our donors were dedicated this April 30, but there will always be room for more names.
